What The Co-operative is doing for bees:



The Co-operative has launched Plan Bee, a new campaign and 10-point plan to help reverse the worrying decline in the British bee population.

Through Plan Bee:

1. The Co-operative Food will temporarily prohibit the use of neonicotinoid-based pesticides on own-brand fresh produce. These are Acetamiprid, Clothianidin, Dinotefuran, Fipronil, Imidacloprid, Nitenpyram, Thiacloprid and Thiamethoxam. To find out about The Co-operative's market-leading policy on pesticides, please see our latest [Sustainability Report](#) (p.95).
2. £150,000 will be made available to support research into the demise of the honeybee, with a particular focus on UK farming, pesticides and gene-diversity. This is the largest ever private contribution to bee research in the UK.
3. Over three years The Co-operative Farms will trial a new wildflower seed mix that will be planted alongside crops on our farms across the UK.
4. The Co-operative Farms will invite beekeepers to establish hives on all our farms in the UK.
5. The Co-operative will engage our three-million members in a campaign to protect and nurture the bee population in the UK, with advice and tips featuring on our website.
6. Members were invited to attend one of 40 screenings of a special preview from a forthcoming film that addresses the decline of the worldwide bee population and the significance of the bee in food production. In addition, The Co-operative has also commissioned a new bespoke documentary on the decline of the bee population in the UK.
7. The Co-operative will partner with RSPB's 'Homes for Wildlife' team and empower members to garden in ways that are honeybee-friendly.
8. An initial 20,000 packets of wildflower seed mix will be made available to members free of charge.
9. Bee boxes are being sourced and made available to The Co-operative members at discounted prices.
10. The Co-operative will support our members and colleagues to find out more about amateur beekeeping and will encourage links between local beekeepers and members.

Monthly Meeting Minutes

01/22/2009

The January monthly meeting was held at the Canton Arts Council building in Canton on Thursday, January 22, 2009. Approximately 46 members and guests were present. The business meeting was opened by President Ryan Sarks at 7:05 pm.

Old Business

- Reminder that our 2009 Bee School will be held at the historic Old Cherokee County Courthouse on February 28.
- The Treasurer reported that our Club bank account has a balance of \$2,583.20.

New Business

- The Treasurer provided a brief overview of the Club's 2009 budget. In 2009, we plan on having several more speakers than in 2008; with the net result reducing our end of 2009 bank account balance to approximately \$2,000 which is approximately one year's operating expenses.
- Ryan Sarks provided an overview of the Committees established for 2009 and called for additional volunteers.

- Pat Sarks, Librarian, gave an overview of several books that the Club could purchase and solicited input for additional media for the Library.

The business meeting was adjourned at 7:25 pm to open the floor for a presentation on current bee research by Dr. Jamie Ellis for the University of Florida. Dr. Ellis is an Assistant Professor of Entomology and Director of the University's Honey Bee Research and Extension Lab.

Some interesting highlights of Dr. Ellis' presentation follow – in no particular order:

- On CCD
 - In the 1940's, the US had more than 5 million honeybee colonies; today we have only about half that number
 - In most years, it is normal to experience a 10% to 20% loss of colonies
 - Since CCD was first noticed in November 2006, we still have no definitive cause; some possibilities include:
 - Traditional bee pests and diseases
 - Management (isn't Labor always blaming Management for every problem:>)
 - Queen source
 - Genetically modified crops
 - Varroa mites
 - Inadequate nutrition (from commercial single crop, non-varied pollen / nectar diets)
 - Chemical use in the hive
 - Chemicals in the environment
 - Climate change
 - Undiscovered pathogens
 - Or a combination of the above

- On studies his Lab is conducting:
 - Can bumble bees sustain small hive beetles (SHB) – thus thwarting our efforts to eliminate them from honey bee hives
 - IPM methods for controlling SHB
 - Varroa mites and the pathogens associated with them
 - Nutritional fitness of bees
 - Productivity increases from use of MegaBee and BeePro supplemental feeds
 - Undiscovered bee pathogens such as IAPV and Nosema Ceranae
 - Chemicals in colonies and the environment
- Field Guide to Beekeeping – Dr. Ellis and his staff are creating a free visual resource in the form of short IPM training videos tailored specifically for beekeepers but made available to the public through Solutions for Your Life (UFhoneybee.com), YouTube, and other video outlets. The videos will range from informational clips about honey bee pests to detailed instructions on how to treat these pests via IPM. His Lab has already participated in a small pilot program in cooperation with the UF Genetics Department to produce several short videos. Dr. Ellis hopes to release them in March. Until then, you can see several other videos he produced on YouTube. They are titled: “I Heart Honeybees”, “Bee Love”, “Honey, I’m home”, “Show Me the Honey”, “Where are the Bees?”, and “African Honey Bees: Public Enemy #1”. These videos were the inspiration for Dr. Ellis’ upcoming Video Field Guide to Beekeeping (which will be more professionally done).

The meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:00 pm.

North 515 to the first red light – HWY 108 – turn right. Go approx 2 miles and you will come to a four-way stop. Go straight and you will be on HWY 53E. Stay on 53E for approx 12.8 miles; you will pass the Foothills IGA and the turn to Big Canoe on your left, then the Handy Corner Store/Cowart Road on the right. Slow down – this is a curvy section of 53! Our road is the only gravel street on the right between Cowart Road and the Amicalola River (if you get to the Amicalola River Bridge you have gone too far!). Turn right onto Amicalola Forest Drive. Look for the 2nd mailbox (third drive) on right - #178 / Cagle. Keep coming up the drive until you see the house.

South 515 – HWY 53 E – go thru Jasper to the four way stop at Tate. Turn left. Stay on 53E for approx 12.8 miles; you will pass the Foothills IGA and the turn to Big Canoe on your left, then the Handy Corner Store/Cowart Road on the right. Slow down – this is a curvy section of 53!
